Attractions in and around Squamish, BC: West Coast Railway Heritage Park, has one of the largest collection of railway rolling stock and artifacts in Canada. - BC Museum of Mining designated as a National Historic Site, activities, displays and guided underground tours. - The Squamish Spit, The Spit is a long breakwater located at the mouth of the Squamish River, BC.	37.6	60.5

Garibaldi Park is a favourite destination of outdoor enthusiasts: it offers a range of hiking opportunities on well-developed trails from a few hours to a few days, using map and compass. Garibaldi Park has an interesting geological background as it was created by volcanic action which formed many of the park's peaks; the Black Tusk, Price Mountain, The Table, Mount Garibaldi, the Cinder Cone and the Glacier Pikes just to name a few. Between November and March, literally thousands of eagles call Squamish / Brackendale home. In 1994 3,700 eagles were counted in one day along the 15 kilometre stretch of the Squamish Valley. Local tour operators provide rafting tours and walking tours. An excellent way to go, as the Eagle's habitat is protected and there is limited access to these areas. This park offers 108 vehicle accessible campsites. 82 of these sites can accommodate a large camper with trailer; 11 are medium sized sites; and 3 are small sites. There are 11 double sites.
